You can paint your hand and press it down on paper and you would see a copy of your hand print.</li> <li>Know that your shoe makes a print if you step in mud or paint.</li> <li>Know that a print can be made by different objects (e.g.: plastic shapes of lids, leaves, lego, wheels etc.)</li> <li>Know that objects can be printed to create a repeating pattern.</li> </ul>

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creates seemingly impossible, temporary balanced sculptures from un-worked rock and stone in public spaces near his home in San Francisco. Dan was born in Indonesia, and worked as a warehouseman before discovering the artistic possibilities of rock along the San Francisco Bay shoreline and his emergent skill in manipulating them.
